Connecting faith and daily life

Cleansed and cleaned

Caroline Hodgson reflects on Isaiah 6:1-8 [9-end]; Psalm 138; 1 Corinthians 15:1-11 and Luke 5:1-11

Old Testament oday's reading recounts Isaiah's calling to be the messenger of God. In verse 5 the prophet says something intriguing: "I am a man of unclean lips... yet my eyes have seen the King". His eyes have taken in the sight of the Lord, yet he feels unworthy of this vision, unable to do it justice, unfit to express it. In response the seraph cleanses Isaiah's lips with fire, to which Isaiah utters his simple response: "Here am I; send me!"

The idea of being unworthy is echoed in Luke. When Peter witnesses the miracle of the catch of fish, he falls down before Jesus saying, "Go away from me, Lord, for I am a sinful man!" In response Jesus tells him not to be afraid, and gives him his mission – to catch people.

Often, a sense of superiority is an obstacle to faith. Sometimes, it's a sense of unworthiness, of feeling overwhelmed by God's greatness. In his letter to the Corinthians, Paul says he is "unfit to be called an apostle". He goes on to say what redeems him – it is "by the grace of God" that he is worthy.

Of course, like Paul, we need to be humble. But one of the first steps towards an active, engaged life of faith is to accept our worthiness and know that, with God's grace, we are indeed up to the task. Without this Isaiah would never have become a great prophet, Peter would not have been the rock upon which the Church is built, and Paul would not have become a tireless and prodigiously productive apostle and activist. 👻



Lord God, through our own efforts we are indeed unworthy, unfit and undeserving. Help us to accept that and move on from it, to a place where we are willing and able to receive your grace, through which we can do your work. Amen.

Apprenticeship Week

In the run-up to National Apprenticeship Week, which runs from 4 to 8 March, we look at apprenticeship and learning in a Christian context.

The apprenticeship system first developed in the late Middle Ages. Master craftsmen would employ young people as an inexpensive form of labour in exchange for training, food and lodging. By the early 1900s, large companies such as Belfastbased marine manufacturers Harland and Wolff were taking on apprentice welders, riveters, platers, plumbers, painters, carpenters and designers. In the 1960s one third of boys left school to become apprentices. In the late twentieth and early twenty-first centuries, however, apprenticeship fell out of favour in the UK. Recently it has seen a revival, as it is increasingly recognised that young people need support and encouragement to enter and flourish in the skilled trades.

"We must grow up in every way into him who is the head, into Christ," wrote Paul to the Ephesians. We spend our lives as apprentices in faith, with Christ we grow in faith and understanding. 👻

Lesserknown Bible characters

Barnabas was an influential early Christian, whose story is told in the book of Acts. The disciples gave him his name, which means "Son of Encouragement".

Barnabas encouraged Paul. The disciples did not trust Paul because he had persecuted Christians. Barnabas spoke up for

him, convincing the disciples that Paul's conversion was genuine. Barnabas also encouraged the spread of Christianity beyond Israel. When lots of Gentiles came to faith in Antioch, Barnabas was sent to find out what was happening. What he witnessed delighted him. He sought out Paul and the two of them stayed in Antioch to teach these converts. This marked the start of Paul's ministry to non-Jews, which Barnabas continued to encourage, working alongside him on his first missionary journey.

Without Barnabas we may never have had Paul's ministry and the Gospel may not have spread around the world as it has. Barnabas truly was "full of the Holy Spirit and of faith". 🤎

<u>An introduction from Kevin Wright, our new Priest</u> <u>from April 2019</u>



Dear Friends,

My faith journey began as a child in Gloucester, growing up in a Christian family with a knowledge of the love of Jesus and my parents setting an example of commitment to church and Sunday School.

My father, Fred, was ordained when I was a teenager and people asked if I should follow him into the church. After due consideration, I felt my calling was to teach Chemistry and Science, which I did, later also adding ICT, for over 30 years. It was the right vocation.

I met Chris, my wife, when she was at college in Gloucester and we married while I was at university in Southampton. We have throughout the years always served our local church and supported and encouraged each other in our faith. Chris was also a teacher. She is an accredited Lay Worship Assistant, member of the Diocesan Synod, and, among other things, a spinner, weaver and knitter.

Over the years the discipline of regular church attendance, the Eucharist, daily scripture reading and prayer has helped us through both joyful and painfully traumatic times. My father's unpleasant but dignified death, my younger daughter's acute mental illness, experience of injustice and other life events have all shaped our faith and about twelve years ago I felt called to reconsider ordination. God's timing is perfect – this time it felt so right and I was quickly accepted and trained on The Oxford Ministry Course at Cuddesdon, which is an exemplary microcosm of the Church of England in its tolerance and breadth of churchmanship.

After a three-year Curacy in villages near Oxford, I moved to work as Rector in Woolavington with Cossington and Bawdrip and have now been called to work in TPOTS. For Chris and me it feels so right, and this has been confirmed by many other people, including the discernment panel here. The Holy Spirit has clearly led us to this point, and we see an exciting future ministry with you in these villages.

We have two married daughters and two grandsons, all of whom attend and serve in their own churches. To relax I enjoy many activities including holidays, music (both playing and listening), painting, walking and watching rugby. We have two cats. I still maintain a passion for Science and stand in awe of God's creation. God's world is great and being stunned into silence in His awesome presence seems to me to be a wonderful way to worship. We are after all human beings, not human doings.
