Take heart

Heather Smith reflects on Ezekiel 36:24-28

he first heart transplant was carried out by Dr Christiaan Barnard in 1967 in in Cape Town, a huge step in medical history. While not exactly routine, as many as two hundred heart transplants take place in the UK every year. You may be a candidate if you have severe heart failure – that is, your heart is unable to keep up with the demands on it because it cannot pump blood with normal efficiency.

It can certainly be difficult to keep up with the demands that life places on our hearts. Perhaps you have too much to cope with in your family life or, at the other extreme, suffer from loneliness. Maybe you find it hard to know where to channel your compassionate energies – so many people need help. Perhaps you struggle with issues from your past.

The solution to all our heart problems, according to Ezekiel, is that God will take out our hearts of stone and replace them with hearts of flesh. "Ah" you might say, "If only my heart were harder I wouldn't suffer so much." If you receive a surgical heart transplant things are never quite the same. It may save your life, but you need to take some precautions, including taking immunosuppressants for the rest of your life. If you receive a heart transplant from God, says Ezekiel, it comes with a new spirit. The combination, far from making us less able to cope, may be the key to Christ-like compassion.



Lord God, put a new heart within me, and direct my energy and my compassion in your ways. Amen.

Walking the Camino has many joys - the people you meet and walk alongside, the beautiful countryside, historic towns and villages you pass through, the flora and fauna. There is abundant bird life. The route we took is the Via de la Plata, an old Roman road, dead

straight for much of the way. Some of the places you travel through are quite remote and, while many of the albergues (hostels) have modern facilities, others are very basic. A "consumersociety" approach will not work here. The Camino is what it is. I have to adapt to it, not vice versa. It teaches me to be self-sufficient and, ultimately, grateful. 💚

Paul and Silas in Prison

One day, as we were going to the place of prayer, we met a slave-girl who had a spirit of divination and brought her owners a great deal of money by fortune-telling. While she followed Paul and us, she would cry out, 'These men are slaves of the Most High God, who proclaim to you a way of salvation.' She kept doing this for many days. But Paul, very much annoyed, turned and said to the spirit, 'I order you in the name of Jesus Christ to come out of her.' And it came out that very hour.

But when her owners saw that their hope of making money was gone, they seized Paul and Silas and dragged them into the market-place before the authorities. When they had brought them before the magistrates, they said, 'These men are disturbing our city; they are Jews and are advocating customs that are not lawful for us as Romans to adopt or observe.' The crowd joined in attacking them, and the magistrates had them stripped of their clothing and ordered them to be beaten with rods. After they had given them a severe flogging, they threw them into prison and ordered the jailer to keep them securely. Following these instructions, he put them in the innermost cell and fastened their feet in the stocks.

About midnight Paul and Silas were praying and singing hymns to God, and the prisoners were listening to them. Suddenly there was an earthquake, so violent that the foundations of the prison were shaken; and immediately all the doors were opened and everyone's chains were unfastened. When the jailer woke up and saw the prison doors wide open, he drew his sword and was about to kill himself, since he supposed that the prisoners had escaped. But Paul shouted in a loud voice, 'Do not harm yourself, for we are all here.' The jailer called for lights, and rushing in, he fell down trembling before Paul and Silas. Then he brought them outside and said, 'Sirs, what must I do to be saved?' They answered, 'Believe on the Lord Jesus, and you will be saved, you and your household.' They spoke the word of the Lord to him and to all who were in his house. At the same hour of the night he took them and washed their wounds; then he and his entire family were baptized without delay. He brought them up into the house and set food before them; and he and his entire household rejoiced that he had become a believer in God.

ask not only on behalf of these, but also on behalf of those who will believe in me through their word, that they may all be one.
