A temper tantrum



Caroline Hodgson *reflects on* Galatians 5:1. 13-25

aul, in this famous passage about the fruit of the Spirit, wrestles with the notion of true freedom. He sees it in binary terms – the flesh on the one hand, the Spirit on the other. We might balk at this, or even find it unpalatable. Perhaps that's because we tend to think that the denial and suppression of human physicality, particularly sexuality, has resulted in some terrible cases of abuse.

But that isn't to say that this passage has nothing to say to us, and it's interesting to think about Paul's definition of freedom. Because we persist, don't we, in equating freedom with doing what we like. Like a toddler having a tantrum we push the boundaries, screaming and stamping our feet, insisting that we know what we want. But who is freer – the smoker who's "gasping" for a cigarette, chained to the habit, or the non-smoker who simply doesn't have the addiction that costs the other so dearly, in terms of both health and money? It's as though we're trying to prove that we're invincible and immortal, with bottomless bank accounts. But all we're really doing is playing little power games – with one another, our health, our finances, and even life itself.

Hopefully we have a healthily holistic view of our selves, perceiving our physicality as God-given, as well as our spirituality. We may quibble with one aspect of Paul's message, but the core of it is as true as ever – we are "called to freedom" and "Christ has set us free".

Lord, sometimes I need to grow up and stop playing games. Show me your way of true freedom, I pray, and make me fruitful in the Spirit. To the glory of your name. Amen.

Second Reading

Galatians 5. 1, 13-25

For freedom Christ has set us free. Stand firm, therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery.

For you were called to freedom, brothers and sisters; only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for self-indulgence, but through love become slaves to one another. For the whole law is summed up in a single commandment, 'You shall love your neighbour as yourself.' If, however, you bite and devour one another, take care that you are not consumed by one another. The Works of the Flesh

Live by the Spirit, I say, and do not gratify the desires of the flesh. For what the flesh desires is opposed to the Spirit, and what the Spirit desires is opposed to the flesh; for these are opposed to each other, to prevent you from doing what you want. But if you are led by the Spirit, you are not subject to the law. Now the works of the flesh are obvious: fornication, impurity, licentiousness, idolatry, sorcery, enmities, strife, jealousy, anger, quarrels, dissensions, factions, envy, drunkenness, carousing, and things like these. I am warning you, as I warned you before: those who do such things will not inherit the kingdom of God. The Fruit of the Spirit

By contrast, the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. There is no law against such things. And those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires. If we live by the Spirit, let us also be guided by the
