

Caroline Hodgson *reflects on* Luke 19:1-10 and Luke 6:20-31

f we're observing All Saints' Day, in our Gospel reading we hear four of the Beatitudes (Luke lists four, whereas Matthew has nine). It's the last one that can trip us up, stop us in our tracks: "What's that you say? I'm blessed when people hate... exclude... revile... defame me on account of the Son of Man?" I should rejoice and leap for joy? How am I supposed to spread the Good News if nobody likes me? Surely I have an obligation to be likeable for the sake of my faith?

Just to be clear – this is not about being bullied. Nobody should ever put up with that. Nor is it about being a doormat. Nor is Jesus telling his listeners to go out of their way to be unlikeable. To go a bit deeper, let's turn to the story of Zacchaeus the tax collector, as told in today's reading for those who are observing the Fourth Sunday before Advent. Zacchaeus is an inspirational example because he had the courage to do the right thing, to seek out the truth, despite his unpopularity, and despite his short stature. He recognised Jesus and he wasn't going to let anything get in the way of an encounter with him.

Never mind what people think of us – meeting the Son of Man is worth risking everything for – even being unpopular in plain sight, even shinning up the nearest tree.



Lord God, thank you for the Beatitudes and for the example of Zacchaeus. Teach me courage, confidence and commitment, not in myself, but in you, to do whatever it takes. Amen.

The creeds

In a four-part series Kathryn Fleming, Canon Pastor at Coventry Cathedral, examines the Christian creeds.

In the earliest days the Church Fathers spoke of a "rule of faith" – beliefs held "always, everywhere, framework for daily living. Prime among them is the simple lifechanging "Jesus is Lord!" To declare this is the start of everything – but may not be enough to ensure

unanimity of purpose. So, with institutional efficiency, the early Church formed a committee – and the process of establishing the creeds began.

The creeds provide a snapshot of our corporate identity as the Church, a Church growing from deep roots in a historic tradition that helps us to frame our experience of God's activity in our own lives and our world. Each of us meets God in different ways, which can contribute by all" – which are both a series to our collective understanding. But of intellectual propositions and a since the Church is greater than the sum of its parts, a body of systematic and agreed statements of faith confirms our corporate identity and ensures we're heading in the same direction. 芝

Damage to the environment may be deliberate: crops wiped

out, oil wells set on fire and forests decimated, for instance. However, harming the earth is often an unintentional consequence of warfare. Ammunition, for example, can contain poisonous metals such as mercury and lead which have been linked to birth defects and cancers and contaminate the environment long after use. In 2001 the United Nations

declared November 6th a day to reflect upon the impact that war has on our environment. The UN believes that protecting the natural world goes hand in hand with a peaceful future. To quote their website: "there can be no durable peace if the natural resources that sustain livelihoods and ecosystems are destroyed".

We need never shout across the spaces to an absent God. He is nearer than our own soul, closer than our most secret thoughts.

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Bible Readings

First Reading

Daniel 7. 1-3,15-18

In the first year of King Belshazzar of Babylon, Daniel had a dream and visions of his head as he lay in bed. Then he wrote down the dream: I, Daniel, saw in my vision by night the four winds of heaven stirring up the great sea, and four great beasts came up out of the sea, different from one another.

As for me, Daniel, my spirit was troubled within me, and the visions of my head terrified me. I approached one of the attendants to ask him the truth concerning all this. So he said that he would disclose to me the interpretation of the matter: 'As for these four great beasts, four kings shall arise out of the earth. But the holy ones of the Most High shall receive the kingdom and possess the kingdom for ever—for ever and ever.'

Gospel Reading

Luke 6. 20-31

Then he looked up at his disciples and said: 'Blessed are you who are poor, for yours is the kingdom of God. 'Blessed are you who are hungry now, for you will be filled. 'Blessed are you who weep now, for you will laugh.

'Blessed are you when people hate you, and when they exclude you, revile you, and defame you on account of the Son of Man. Rejoice on that day and leap for joy, for surely your reward is great in heaven; for that is what their ancestors did to the prophets.

'But woe to you who are rich,
for you have received your consolation.
'Woe to you who are full now,
for you will be hungry.
'Woe to you who are laughing now,
for you will mourn and weep.

'Woe to you when all speak well of you, for that is what their ancestors did to the false prophets.

'But I say to you that listen, Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who abuse you. If anyone strikes you on the cheek, offer the other also; and from anyone who takes away your coat do not withhold even your shirt. Give to everyone who begs from you; and if anyone takes away your goods, do not ask for them again. Do to others as you would have them do to you.

Second Reading

Ephesians 1. 11-end

In Christ we have also obtained an inheritance, having been destined according to the purpose of him who accomplishes all things according to his counsel and will, so that we, who were the first to set our hope on Christ, might live for the praise of his glory. In him you also, when you had heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation, and had believed in him, were marked with the seal of the promised Holy Spirit; this is the pledge of our inheritance towards redemption as God's own people, to the praise of his glory.

I have heard of your faith in the Lord Jesus and your love towards all the saints, and for this reason I do not cease to give thanks for you as I remember you in my prayers. I pray that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, may give you a spirit of wisdom and revelation as you come to know him, so that, with the eyes of your heart enlightened, you may know what is the hope to which he has called you, what are the riches of his glorious inheritance among the saints, and what is the immeasurable greatness of his power for us who believe, according to the working of his great power.

God put this power to work in Christ when he raised him from the dead and seated him at his right hand in the heavenly places, far above all rule and authority and power and dominion, and above every name that is named, not only in this age but also in the age to come. And he has put all things under his feet and has made him the head over all things for the church, which is his body, the fullness of him who fills all in all.
